


## **PART I: Colonial Africa**

MAP 2: Africa, 1914 - After the Scramble for Africa






Africa, 1914. Before 1800, Africa was controlled by numerous African states. By 1914, all of Africa, with the exceptions of Ethiopia and Liberia, was under the control or oversight of European powers.








#### Questions:

- 5. According to Map 2, which two African countries remained independent of European rule?
- 6. Now compare Map 2 to a contemporary map of Africa, located here. How did the Scramble for Africa in the 1800s and 1900s affect the current borders of Africa?
- 7. Examine the cartoon titled "The Mad Scramble for Africa." Write a paragraph analysis of it. Be very specific in the analysis, explaining not only the main message of the cartoon, but also each of the figures present in it. You may want to refer to Map 2 to help you make sense of why the countries are located where they are.

### PART II: Colonial Asia










#### Questions:

  - (b) Which countries did this Asian nation control?
- 4. Which countries on a contemporary map of the Middle East did the Ottoman Empire control in 1914? (You may want to click here to see a contemporary map of the Middle East)
- 5. Examine the map of China and answer the following questions:
  - (a) What is a "sphere of influence"?
  - (b) Which countries had spheres of influence in China in 1910?
  - (c) Why didn't the United States have a sphere of influence? (This answer is not evident in the map itself ... think back to the history of the United States and China in 1899)
