Introduction:

In 1517, when Luther nailed his *95 Theses* to the church door in Wittenberg, Pope Leo X headed the Catholic Church. Two years later, Charles V of Spain was elected Holy Roman Emperor. In this lesson, you will study the response of the Pope and the Emperor to Luther's *Theses*. As you read the documents, think about reasons why they might have responded as intensely as they did.
