The British Monarchy

Should the United Kingdom still have a king or queen? Ever since the conflict between king and Parliament in the 1600s, the monarch has had a restricted role in the government.

Critics of the monarchy sometimes claim that the royal family is an expensive luxury. Monarchy's defenders reply that Queen Elizabeth II's wealth—perhaps about \$500 million—allows her to pay her own way. Her accountants agree. In 2006 a report from the office of Royal Public Finances stated that Queen Elizabeth II and her family cost each citizen of the United Kingdom only about \$1.13 per year. In addition, the monarchy's supporters point out that the tourist industry, which is worth more

than \$300 billion per year, would suffer if the romance of royalty were eliminated. Elizabeth II can also sometimes defuse a touchy situation with other heads of state, since she does not represent a particular political viewpoint.

Perhaps the best argument for the monarchy is its power as a symbol. It represents continuity—the ability of the kingdom's people to survive centuries of global turmoil and still live in relative peace with each other.
